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## SGA candidates vow to make improvements at UMKC

Advocates and Vision promise significant change for UMKC students

I think this change is one that could occur whether or not I am elected Student Government Association President. I feel that this is something that can be started by a few people and over time will catch on. During my three years here at UMKC, I have been to several programs and sporting events which have lacked in student participation or walked around campus on a "Blue Day' and found many not wearing either blue or UMKC clothing. I have also heard people say that "I only go to class at UMKC; I do not go to any of the activities."
